



This new arm will automatically switch the weaving yarn from right to left making weaving as easy and fast as knitting stockinette. Many of you have probably seen it demonstrated at various seminars and workshops as we have several samples circulating. Watch for more details on this item as I am sure it will revolutionize the weaving capabilities.

That seems to be all that is in the immediate new category, but I am sure there will be more items from time to time. It always appears like the finished product is so simple once you see how it is done.

MONEY BAG

Made on a Studio #322 Knittery Card #49
Money Matters

Make 2 pieces - tension not important

Cast on 50 stitches Work 10 rows plain 53 rows pattern 10 rows plain

<u>Lining</u>
Cast on 50 stitches. Knit 146 rows. Bind off.

Crochet around top making loops and knit two cords and pull through. Drawstring through top, matching wooden beads attached to ends.




Camisole Dress

This dress is sized for bust 80cm - 105cm, hip 85cm - 110cm and skirt length 66cm but adjustable.

Materials / others:

Cotton Boucle yarn (light weight)
Col.A (white)300gs.
Fine cotton thread
Col.B (blue)70gs.
Col.C (red)70gs.
Col.D (yellow)70gs.
N. B. If you do not own either 4-colour
Auto-Tension or extra Auto-Ten-
sion, use two colours of yarn.
waste yarnreasonable amount
shirring elastic18m. long
Punch Card A (punch as shown below.)

Tension Gauge:

30 sts. by 50 rows over the swatch of Knit-In with Stitch Dial at 5.

To knit


Knit the back and front, following the patterns given on pages 8-9 and instructions below.

(skirt) - 2 pieces alike -


- Set Punch Card and lock at CM 1.
- Bring out the required number of Nds. to B pos., and push back every second Nd. to A pos. to have needle arrangement as shown below.



- SD 4, cast on and knit several rows with waste yarn.
- Col.A into F ①, knit 5 rows in Stockinet.
- Arrange Nds. as shown below and knit 5 rows.




 Bring out the Nds. in A pos. to B pos. as shown below, and knit up to the folding line in Stockinet.



- * Knit the facing in the above manner to have the hem finer.
- Set the Carriage as follows:
 Cam Lever Stockinet
 Side Levers ▼
- SD 5, knit 2 rows in Stockinet.
- Cam Lever to Knit-In, and Col.B in F(2).
- Release Card and knit up to the joining line, exchanging the colour of yarn in F2, following the diagram for Card A on page 4.
- Pick up the sts. from the first row of main knitting and place them onto the corresponding Nds. (place the sts. onto every second Nd.)
- Remove the waste knitting and knit
 1 row with SD 6.
- SD 5, knit up to the waist Knit-In, and remove the fabric on waste knitting.

Block out to size, and press with steam iron.

(back)



- Bring out the Nds. for knitting back to B pos.
- Pick up the sts. from the last row of skirt and place them onto the Nds. in B pos., decreasing sts. through the row evenly to fit the waist line of back.
- Lock Punch Card at CM 1.
- (1)— Work shirring at waist in the following manner.
 - Set the Carriage as follows:

 Cam Lever.....Stockinet

Side Levers▼
Weaving Knobs....∼

*For the knitter without Weaving Knobs, attach the Weaving Arm.

- 2 SD 5, Col.A in F 1, knit 2 rows in Stockinet.
- 3 Bring out the Nds. in B pos. to D pos. and lay the shirring elastic as shown below.



- 4 SD 7, knit 1 row and break the shirring elastic.
- 5 SD 5, knit 5 rows in Stockinet.
- 6 Repeat the procedure 3 5, twice.

- Repeat 3 4 once and knit 3 rows in Stockinet with SD 5.
- (2)— Set the Carriage as follows:

Cam Lever.....Knit-In Weaving Knobs......


*Remove the Weaving Arm

- Release Card and knit up to uppe shirring in Knit-In in the same manner as for skirt.
- (3)— Work shirring at upper edge in the following manner.
 - ① Set the Carriage as follows:

 Cam Lever...... Stockinet

 Weaving Knobs...... ∼
 - *For the knitter without Weaving Knobs, attach the Weaving Arm.
 - ②SD ⑤, Col.A in F ①, Knit 2 rows in Stockinet.
 - ③ Bring out the Nds. in B pos. to D pos. and lay the shirring elastic in the same manner as for shirring at waist.
 - (4) SD (7), knit 1 row and break the shirring elastic.
 - (5) SD (5), knit 3 rows in Stockinet.
 - 6 Repeat the procedure 3-5 , twice.
 - Repeat 3 4 once and knit 4 or 5 rows in Stockinet ending with the Carriage at right.
 - 8 Knit 1 row with SD and cast off using Tappet Tool or Automatic Linker.

(front)



 Knit front in the same manner as for back but for working partial knitting by decreasing on both sides before shirring at upper edge.

(cords)

Knit 12 cords – four of them in Col.B, another four in Col.C and the rest in Col.D.

- Set the Carriage as follows:


Cam Lever.....Slip Side Levers.....▼ (left)

(right)

 Cast on 4 sts. by winding method and knit 55cm. long.

To make up

- Block out back and front to size and press with steam iron.
- Join side seams with blind stitch.
- Sew three cords of each colour as shown below.



- Pull up the shirring elastics and gather the waist and the upper edge to fit your waist and bust respectively.
- Tie together both ends of shirring elastics to prevent the gathers from slipping.
- Give final pressing.





30 sts. by 214 rows over the swatch of Tuck Stitch Pattern with Stitch Dial at (7).

To knit




- Set Punch Card and lock at CM 1.
- Set the Carriage as follows:

Cam Lever.....Stockinet Side Levers.....▼

Tuck Knobs

- *For the knitters without Tuck Knobs, attach extra round brushes.
- Bring out 30 Nds. on the left side of centre(0) and 20 Nds. on the right to B pos.
- SD (7), cast on with waste yarn and knit several rows.
- (1)— Col.B in F①, knit 1 row in Stockinet.
 - Release Card, set Cam Lever to Tuck and knit 20 rows.
 - Pick up the sts. from the first row of Tuck Knitting and place the onto the corresponding Nds.
- (2) Lock Card at CM 1.

- Exchange Col.B for Col.C, set Cam Lever to Stockinet and knit 1 row with SD 8, and 4 rows with SD 7.
 - Release Card, set Cam Lever to Tuck and knit 20 rows.
 - Pick up the sts. from the first row of Tuck Knitting and place them onto the corresponding Nds.
- (3) Repeat (2) 7 times, exchanging the colour of yarn.



- Knit 1 row in Stockinet and remove the fabric on waste knitting.
- (4)— Pick up the sts. from the first row of main knitting with its purl side facing and put the sts. back onto the machine.
 - Knit and cast off in the same manner in steps (1) (3).

(cords)

- Knit 3 cords of 4 sts. in different colour for 120cm. long each in Col.B, Col.C and Col.D respectively.
- Plait 3 cords together down entire length and secure both ends by making a single knot.

To make up

- Press with a steam iron carefully to have scalloped edge.
- Join side seams with blind stitch.
- Work 2 rows of slip stitch with Col.D, using crochet hook along the upper edge.
- Sew both ends of plait at side seams as illustrated below.



The Knit Contour pattern for the Camisole Dress is on pages 8, 9, and 10.

Another easy-to-make pattern for this summer comes from Erma Jeanne Argyle in Provo, UT.

QUICKIE RIBBED TUBE SUNTOP

1 2-oz. skein Lustersheen or similar cotton-like yarn for small size (21" chest), two for large size (27" chest).

Gauge: Not important.


Approximately 9 rows = 1"
at Ten. 7 Studio SK-326


Special quick and flexible cast-on:


Set up for 1xl rib on an even number of needles, with one more on the ribber on the left side. Use 160 sts. for small, 196 for large size. With indicator at P, rack to 3. Set garment tension. Knit zig-zag row. Hang CO comb without weights. Rack back to 5 (the normal setting). Knit back across (slowly and carefully) and then hang the weights. Cast-on is complete.

Continue knitting body of garment, making row of eyelets 1/2 inch from bottom edge. Knit 60 rows for small size or 80 for large, making another row of eyelets 1/2 inch from top edge.

Quick on-the-machine bind-off: Transfer sts. to knitter bed. Knit 1 row from right to left at T. =10+ (or hand-knit back almost to OWP to make these sts. quite loose). Cont. to page 11.







Tube Suntop (Cont. from page 7)

Bind off with latch tool, bringing second st. through first, 3rd through Fits - 40 - 42 inch bust (size 16-18) 2nd, etc., across row.

OR use neat, flexible hand bind-off: Change controls for circular knit. take off on scrap knit circular. Kitchener the ribbed sts. together like when the knit sides are out. Do not pull tight.

Fin ling: Make two 3-st. cords long enough to go around chest, 500 to 700 rows. Sew seam by hand or machine. Thread eyelets with cords. Cords can go over shoulders if desired, with elastic through eyelets.

If a larger top is desired, make two pieces, increasing length as needed.

Another pretty pattern from Erma Jeanne is this one for

KAY'S PUFFED SLEEVE SWEATER


Made on a Studio SK-326

This high-style sweater has puffy push-up sleeves and a subtle pattern of tucked diamonds in the purled fabric. The knit side is also very pretty.

The original punch-card is designed for double duty - its next job will be a series of afghan panels.

Yarr 22 oz. 4-ply sparkle knitting

Gauge: 9 sts., 15 rows = 2"



Tension: 10 except as otherwise

SLEEVES - Cast on 70 sts. with waste yarn and knit 10-15 rows. Knit 1 row of ravel cord. Insert pattern card. Knit 1 row garment yarn. Set cam to tuck. Knitting in pattern, increase 1 st. every 6 rows 15 times on outside edges (to 100 sts.). For ease in seaming, always bring two outside needles both sides every row to D position, so there are no tuck sts. on edges. At RC 96, reset counter and decrease 7 sts. on both sides. Decrease 2 sts. twice, and 1 st. four times. Knit even in pattern to RC 50. Decrease 1 st. every other row 5 times on each side. Bind off. SLEEVE RIBBING - Cast on 50 sts. for 1x1 rib. Beginning with Ten. 7, increase tension every 15 rows by one (.) up to Ten. 8. Knit 6 rows. Transfer sts. to main bed, knit 1 row and take off on scrap. KITCHENER sleeve ribbing to sleeve,

easing in the fullness by doubling stitches.

BACK - Cast on 100 sts. and knit 24 rows of 1x1 rib at Ten. 8. Transfer all sts. to main bed. Insert pattern card and knit 1 row at Ten. 10. Reset RC. Knit in pattern to RC 90. Reset RC and decrease for armholes same as for sleeves (7-1-1, 2-2-2, 1-2-4). At RC 60 divide for neck and shoulders, putting 41 sts. opposite cam into out-of work. On the neck side Continued to next page.

Puffed Sleeve Sweater (Continued)

decrease one st. each row at the same time as you are decreasing 5 sts. every other row on the shoulder. Last dec. has 3 sts. Take shoulder sts. off on scrap. Reset pattern & shape other shoulder & neck, then take these sts. off on scrap separately, and neck sts. off on scrap.

FRONT - Made the same as back up to armholes except Tension = 10.2.

Determine st. either side of 0 which is center of tuck diamond and place it on a safety pin. Put needle out of work. Using transfer tools, cable the two sts. on either side of OWP needle - the cable crosses behind the pinned stitch and strengthens the V. Begin decreasing armhole same as back and sleeve and at the same time dec. at neck edge one st. every 5 rows 12 times. At RC 60, decrease the shoulder 5 sts. e.o.r. 4 times, 3 sts once. Take shoulders off on scrap.

NECK - Rehang shoulder seams, right sides together. Pull second st. through first and bind off. Neckband machine method: Cast on 122 sts. 1x1 rib and knit 1 inch. Transfer all sts. to main bed. Beginning with pinned st., hang neckband on these needles a few inches at a time and bind off seaming the pieces together. Take finished part off in order to hang remainder of neck. Sew edges of ribbing to front where pieces over lap at point of V. Hand method: Pick up 122 sts. and kl, pl around on #1 14" circular needle. Decrease both sides of center (pinned) st. every other row. Bind off after 8 rows.





Ten. 4, knit 28 rows.

RC 000. Put all sts. on main bed. Ten. 6, knit to row 140. RC 000. R O and 1, bind off 5 sts. at beg.

We do not have time to knit each pattern, so cannot check for mistakes. It also helps if you do not abbreviate, as many of your terms are unfamiliar to us and to other readers. A black and white snapshot and/or brief desption of your garment will make it easier to visualize by other readers. Ift of yarn will be sent for snapshots (black and white) printed with

R 40, 41, put 2 sts. opp, 1 st. in front in hold

R 42, 43, put 3 sts. opp, 1 st. in front in hold

R 44, put 1 st in front in hold. R 45, knit 1 row over all sts.& scrap off. RUFFLE - Scrap on 20 sts., where counter clicks, with scrap yarn. Knit 1 row ravel cord. Ten.8, knit 1 row. Put 4 sts. opp. carr. in hold, knit 1 row. Put 1 st. in hold in front of carr., & knit. Repeat until 5 sts. are left. Knit 2 rows over all sts. Repeat short rowing until R.C. reads 1113 or desired length.

SHING - Sew shoulder seams, set sleeves in. Kitchiner the ruffle toer. Single crochet ruffle onto neck, part of ruffle will hang down the front. Do your favorite crochet trim on neck. Sew balance of ruffle together with a seam, and tack loosely to bodice. Sew side seams.
