

A technique which I am sure must be included in every issue is swiss darning. Two colour fairisle can be brought to life with just a little swiss darning – and it is possible to catch long floats at the same time!

Flare may be introduced to a garment – the equivalent to cutting fabric on the bias – by using short row designing. It seems to be a favourite among the more experienced machine knitters. We have used it to produce a wonderful collar, turning a simple cardigan into a fabulous coat – team it with a skirt and sweater and you have a whole outfit!

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# **MOTOR CARS**

Leonardo da Vinci made drawings of one in the late fifteenth century, a Jesuit priest at the court of the Chinese emperor built an experimental one in the seventeenth century but it was not until 1769 that the – MOTOR CAR – was really born.

At that time, the horse was the most common means of transport while the bicycle was still regarded by many with misgivings! But work was going on in many different countries, by different groups of people, searching for a way to self-propel a vehicle.

One of the first to succeed – and often called the father of the modern day motor car – was the Frenchman Captain Nicolas Joseph Cugnot. He invented a steam-gun carriage – a formidable five-ton tricycle built of wood with a high kettle-shaped boiler over the driving wheel. In the summer of 1769, it ran under its own steam for twelve minutes at a speed of 6 miles per hour.

The world's very first motor car, however, was not totally impressive – it proved so violent and difficult to steer that it knocked down a solid wall!

But that was the beginning. This was the age of steam: Cugnot was a contemporary of James Watt and railways were soon to become a familiar sight over England, Europe and, later, America.

The Cornish mining engineer Richard Trevithick produced a steam carriage in 1801; a gentleman by the name Goldsworthy Gurney demonstrated his New Steam Coach round Regent's Park at five miles per hour "belching smoke and smelling like boiled iron" in December 1827 and steam coaches were providing services between London and Brighton by 1840.

But the railways won that particular battle and it was not until


another of the world's major invention that the motor car became more of a reality. The first example of the internal combustion engine was on view in 1857 at a foundry in Florence, produced by the Italians Eugenio Barsanti and Felice Matteuci.

A Frenchman, Etienne Lenoir, patented the idea in 1860 – the first practical gas engine which, two years later, he fixed to a chassis. In this vehicle, he would drive – quite happily – from his factory to his home at a maximum speed of four miles per hour.

There were many other inventors

experimenting at the time but the man responsible for giving the public the first international combustion vehicle was the German, Carl Benz.

In 1885, he was driving a twoseater tricycle around the streets of Mannheim, usually after dark to avoid attention, frequently breaking down to be pushed back to the workshop! At the 1889 World Fair in Paris, the Benz motor car was discovered by the world and by the end of the century, the Benz factory in Mannheim was producing nearly 600 vehicles a year. The motor car was here to stay!
















Almost as soon as the first motor cars were up and running, somebody wanted to push them to the limit! The very first competitive motor race was held in July 1894 from Paris to Rouen. Nowadays, the sport of motor racing is a world-wide, highly sophisticated one: the highlight of which is the Formula One Grand Prix series that has produced such famous names as Stirling Moss, Graham Hill, Jackie Stewart, Fangio, Niki Lauda, Mario Andretti, James Hunt and Ayrton Senna. They drive at fantastic speeds but safety is a priority at every grand prix race. A red light turns to green to set them on their way, but from then on, the world's fastest motor car drivers are ruled by flags: RED is the signal for all cars to stop; YELLOW is the warning signal that there is danger, be prepared; GREEN signals that everything is all right again; BLUE tells a driver that someone is trying to overtake him; WHITE indicates a service car is on the circuit and The BLACK and WHITE CHEQUERED is the one that greets the winner!

# STEP-BY-STEP Using the PPD




Use the PPD to extend your own or built-in stitch pattern designs. We have taken the Steyr logo as a starting point and then used the PPD to achieve an all-over stitch pattern design. The method shown here is how we achieved our garment why not use the same method to design your own!





STEP 1. Draw Steyr logo. Create a Grid for the number of sts and rows required. Print out 5 Steyr logos and Grid. Lay out printed Grid to sweater size – one stitch = 1 square.



STEP 2. Position logos on grid as required. Note bottom left hand position of each logo (Stitch and Row coordinates). Press HELP. Choose option 7 (Load Stored Pattern). STEP. Choose option 1 (From Builtin Pattern). STEP.




STEP 3. Input Pattern No of logo. STEP (Patt appears on Screen). Press 1: ALL (Back to Grid on Screen).\* Press HELP. Choose option 2 (Transfer Cursor). STEP. Input coordinates of logo.



STEP 4. Cursor will move to the bottom left hand corner of logo.




STEP 5. STEP. Logo appears on Screen. Press 1: YES\*. Repeat from \* to \* for each logo. Press HELP.





**STEP 6.** Choose option 1 (End Creation).

While Austro-Daimler produced luxury sports cars in Austria, Steyr catered for the middle market. # SOUVENIRS DU FUTUR

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MINERAL (Letters from Africa) - based on primitive ecology, inspired by the natural colours and rough textures of the barren desert lands. COLOURS: Mineral harmonies, earthy marbled tones, flax, straw, terra cotta, rust, mustard, lime green, khaki, chocolate brown and ebony. MATERIALS: Hand woven effects, rustic textured surface, linen, flax. Rustic cottons, raw silk, net weave, canvas, cotton gabardine, denim, raffia, stoned washed fabrics, aged effects and wrinkled textures. Raffia embroideries, oxydized gold, bronze, primitive prints, batiks, decorated with animals (elephants, lions, zebras...). Transparent effects. SILHOUETTE: Fluid, body skimming clothes, draped effects, layering, asymmetrical sarong skirts, long silk skirts, big shirts over riding skirts, updated safari jackets. Leggings and shorts. DETAILS: Unfinished effects, fringes, raffia trimmings, accessories in natural materials: wood, horn, straw, coconut, hammered metal, aged copper or bronze, stonelike buttons, pebbles, non polished stones. Ethnic embroideries, raffia and cotton, ethnic jewellery, african mosaic beads. Amber, precious woods like ebony.

SPATIAL (Remembering the future) - resolutely modern, futurist for the sophistication of new fabrics. Retro-modern with a flavour of the 1960's for its volumes and obvious inspirations from Courreges, Cardin or Paco Rabanne and their revolutionary ideas. Ideal look for modern city life and the active chic woman. No fuss no ornaments, clean architectured clothes. Jackie Kennedy and her much praised elegance epitomizes this look. It is also great for sportive dynamic junior looks. COLOURS: White is predominant with black and white graphics. Lots of greys, blue, steel, aqua green, pale blue iridescent whites or greys. Mother-of-pearl effects. Lots of silver metallics, oxydized, pewter, aluminum. FABRICS: Modern, technical avantgarde, and all stretch. It is essentially a solid fabric story with a texture interest. Pique, ottoman, rib, crepe, wrinkled, puckered fabrics. Also shiny glazed surface, rayon, spandex, PVC. Stretch shiny knits, blurred sky prints. SILHOU-ETTE: Short, sculptural, clean, very close to the body. A-line dresses. Cropped jackets, zipped, minis and shorts, jumpsuits, short blousons. Leggings and cyclist-shorts in "second skin" fabrics. DETAILS: Graphic contrasts, piping, big buttons, metallic or covered. Silver trimmings, glass plexi beads and ornaments. Mother-ofpearl iridescent effects. Zips and metallic ornaments. Stretch everything!

# CARNETS D'AFRIQUE



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VEGETAL (Province gardens) - country atmosphere provides fresh feminine fashion. Return to authenticity, return to nature, celebration of its riches, flowers, fruits, vegetable. It is very ecological trend with a touch of retro romanticism and peasant-like simplicity. COLOURS: Fresh and acid colours. Pure brights: red, orange, fuchsia, gold, yellow, lettuce green. Shades of blues, turquoise. Pastels, rosewood, with light blue on ecru. FABRICS: Tons of floral prints on various textures: cotton, chintz, voile, fluid rayon, crepe, silk, denim. All the flowers of the creation with the rose as a favourite. Impressionist flowers, small scattered flowers, Liberty prints. Fruits and vegetables, coloured or printed denim, chambray, printed linen. Provence prints, handkerchief checks, peasant stripes. SILHOUETTE: Feminine simple. Long peasant skirts, petticoats, bustiers and bra-tops, lingerie tops and T-shirts, lace and knits. Lots of dresses with scooped necks, bare shoulders and back straps, apron sundresses. DETAILS: A mixture of prints and patterns coordinated patchwork. Lace trim and lingerie finish. Embroideries and braiding. Rickrack braid, flower buttons, and mother-of-pearl. White wood.

AOUATIC (The world of silence - Cousteau) the nautical theme is a must every summer, but next season will be submerged deep down into the sea rather than sailing on the surface. The whole sea world is represented on fabric prints with fishes of all kinds, sea shells and sea weeds, with a touch of exoticism from the tropical or asiatic seas, with a lot of batiks. COLOURS: A symphony of blues and greens worked in shaded tones: navy, indigo, cobalt, denim blue, emeralds, turquoise aqua, sky blue. Touches of bordeaux or bright red and yellow which are the indispensable complements of the sailor theme based on white. FABRICS: A ton of linen, cottons, denim, chambray glazed rubberized fabrics, shiny fabrics, satin, Nylon, PVC. printed cottons and rayon, batiks, sea shells, fishes. Lots of stripes and Batiks. Knit cotton jersey, Lycra jersey. Denim yarn sweaters, cables, fishermar stitch, Crepe, wavy surface materials and knits SILHOUETTE: Altogether sportswear and exotic. Parkas and sailor jackets, jeans and shorts sailor pants, sailor collar tops or hoods. Big sailor T-shirts. DETAILS: Embroidered fishes and shells in gold or natural, as ornaments. Gold sailor buttons, bi-coloured buttons. Contrast pip ing and braiding. Embroideries and badges Mosaic designs.



# **SNOWFLAKE**

Traditional winter knitwear has always favoured snowflakes in different shapes and sizes. This season the snowflake is a particularly strong fashion feature, used as a border pattern, single motif, or an all-over fairisle. We used the PPD to extend our border design - moving it to a central position on the sweater - we show you how it's done Step-by-Step!



The sweater above shows a beautiful single motif - full instructions are given in the Centre Section No. 29



STEP 1. Draw Background and Border designs. Create a Grid for Sweater Front – 185 stitches x 240 rows. HELP: Select 8 [VARIATIONS] STEP – Spread (Horizontal) and Spread (VERTICAL) ON. HELP: Select 7 [LOAD STORED PATTERN]. STEP. Select 1 [FROM BUILT-IN PATTERN]. STEP. Input your Patt No for Background design. STEP. Press 1: ALL. HELP: Select 2 [TRANSFER CURSOR]. STEP. Input Stitch 8 and Row 8. STEP. STEP. Select 1: YES.



STEP 2. HELP: Select 6 [ERASE PART OF PATTERN]. STEP. Set corner to bottom left hand corner of Grid. STEP. Frame Rows 1—35 inclusive. STEP. (Rows 1—35 erase). Select 1: YES. HELP: Select 8 [VARIATIONS] — STEP — Spread (Horizontal) ON. Spread (Vertical) — OFF. HELP: Select 7 [LOAD STORED PATTERN]. STEP. Select 1 [FROM BUILT-IN PATTERN]. STEP. Input your Pattern No of Border design. STEP. Press 1: ALL. HELP: Select 2 [TRANSFER CURSOR]. STEP. Input Stitch 78 and Row 1. STEP. Select 1: YES.


This beautiful suit uses the Ribbing Attachment to maximum advantage. The sweater is worked in Jacquard and the skirt in "Ripple Stitch". Full instructions are given in the Centre Section No. 2



STEP 3. HELP: Select 6 [ERASE PART OF PATTERN]. STEP. Set Corner to (77,33). STEP. Frame 33 to top of Grid. STEP. (Centre Vertical erases). Select 1: YES.




STEP 4. Draw in 2 pattern repeats of the Background design (Bottom Left Hand corner 87,33 and 97,33). HELP: Select 8 [VARIATIONS]. STEP. Spread (Vertical) – ON. Spread (Horizontal) – OFF. HELP: Select 7 [LOAD STORED PATTERN]. STEP. Select 1 [FROM BUILT-IN PATTERN]. STEP. Input your Pattern No for Sweater Front. STEP. Set Corner (82,6). STEP. Frame 23 x 30. STEP. HELP: Select 2 [TRANSFER CURSOR]. STEP. Input st 82 and row 6. STEP. (Pattern Spreads vertically). Select 1: YES. Draw 2 vertical lines alongside central Border design. Erase the end of the vertical Border design. HELP: Select 1 [END CREATION].



# **PLAID**

Or do we mean Tartan? Gaelic, plaide, and Irish, ploid refers to a blanket which was worn around the shoulders and had a chequered pattern. It was this pattern which came to be known as plaid. Tartan originally was the name given to a cloth. It usually had different coloured warp and weft threads which also gave a chequered effect. Over the years the name tartan was given to the pattern of the cloth and not to the cloth itself!



# STEP-BY-STEP SWISS DARNING

An effective way to introduce more colours to a garment. It is worked on the completed garment piece by following the 'line' of the stitch. Use yarn of same or similar thickness to that used for garment.




STEP 1. Bring needle to right side of work through stitch below first stitch to be worked. Following the 'line' of the stitch, insert needle at right of stitch just above and bring it through to the left of the stitch.




STEP 2. Insert needle in stitch below – where it first emerged – and bring it up to the right side through the stitch above the 'swiss darned' stitch.

All our garments are knitted in stripes of fairisle and then swiss darned to give the vertical stripes.





The KH900 is simplicity itself. There are a series of 24 small lamps on the machine, each representing one stitch. The stitch design is entered via Input Keys which illuminate the lamps giving an instant visual display. The machine retains the design in its memory and is recalled when required. In addition, the KH900 has 50 pattern designs already built-in to the memory, and these are selected using a series of number references.



The KH900 is compatible with the full range of Brother accessories such as the KR850 ribber and KA8300 transfer carriage.

The Brother PPD120 is an optional pattern programming device which allows patterns to be designed on a television screen and then transferred to the machine. It also contains a further 853 patterns for knitting on the KH900.





All the popular stitch patterns can be achieved on the KH270 such as fairisle, tuck, slip, weaving, thread lace, plating and single motif.




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MACHINES: A, C or D with Intarsia facility or Intarsia Carriage + KR and KL. MATERIALS: KING COLE Anti-Tickle Superspun Superwash 4-Ply Wool; M - 305 (320, 335, 350, 365)g (Emerald 42), A - 120 (130, 140, 150, 160)g (Anthracite 12), B - 25g (Scarlet 9), C - 10g (Black 48), small amounts in each of D - (Silver 36), E - (Gold 55), F - (Mandarin 164) and G -(White), (100% Wool. 380m/100g) MEASUREMENTS: To fit chest 86 (91, 96, 101, 106)cm. TENSION: St st/Intarsia (when making your tension swatch use Intarsia Carr if you intend to work garment with Intarsia Carr - Intarsia Carr and K-Carr tensions can be very different) - 40 sts = 12cm and 60 rows = 13.8cm (approx T6). RIB: 2 x 1 (see ABBREVIA-TIONS) T2/2. NOTES: See Intarsia Pattern Sheet Nos 1(B) and 2(C).

#### PROCEDURE

Make a tension swatch and set KL accordingly. Draw picture onto KL sheet. Use KL sheet to indicate the picture and foll garment instructions.


#### BACK

Using A cast on over 167 (176, 182, 191, 200) KH Ns as RIB, 000. Knit to RC40. Trans all sts to KH. Inc 1 (0, 2, 1, 0) sts, 000. T6 working in st st/Intarsia throughout knit to RC140. Place a WY marker at each end of work. Knit to RC266. Waste knit centre 66 sts. Waste knit rem 51 (55, 59, 63, 67) sts at each end of work forshoulders.

#### FRONT As BACK to RC234.


Neck shaping

Waste knit centre 26 sts. Waste knit sts at left, COR. Knit 1 row. At beg of next and every foll alt row cast off 4 sts x 1, 3 sts x 2, 2 sts x 3, then dec 1 st x 4. Knit to RC274 and waste knit rem 51 (55, 59, 63, 67) sts. Return sts at left to Ns and knit to match right side reversing shapings.



#### NECKBAND

Join one shoulder by placing one set of shoulder sts back onto Ns with right sides together. Using M T10 knit 1 row and cast off. Push 164 KH Ns into WP. With right side facing, pick up same number of sts evenly along neck edge and place onto Ns. Using M T7 knit 1 row. Trans to RIB, 000. Knit to RC30. Trans all sts to KH T6 knit 2 rows and waste knit. Join second shoulder as first. Join NECKBAND seam, fold in half to outside and backstitch to garment through last row knitted in M.



#### SLEEVES


Push 199 KH Ns into WP. With wrong side facing, pick up same number of sts evenly along armhole edge between WY markers and place onto Ns, 000. Using M T6 knit to RC4. Dec 1 st at each end of next and every foll 5th row x 41. Knit to RC208 and waste knit rem 117 sts. CUFFS: Push 89 KH Ns into WP. With wrong side facing, place sts from cuff edge back onto Ns distributing them evenly along the row. Trans to RIB, 000 knit to RC35. T10/8 knit 1 row. Trans all sts to KH and latch cast off each st individually.

#### MAKE-UP

Swiss darn and embroider as illustrated. Block and press. Join side and SLEEVE seams.



MACHINES: D with KR, KR Colour Changer and PPD 110. MATERIALS: FORSELL Naturell 3-Ply; M - 585 (610, 635, 660, 685)g (White 491), Con Col -320 (340, 360, 380, 400)g (Cusco Grey 492) (80% wool 20% alpaca 620m/100g). 2.5cm wide elastic to fit waist + 2.5cm. MEASUREMENTS: To fit bust 86 (91, 96, 101, 106)cm, hip 91 (96, 101, 106, 111) cm. TENSION: Ripple St Patt - 40 sts = 14.8cm and 60 rows = 6.9cm, after washing, blocking and pressing lightly on the wrong side (approx T2/2). Jacquard St Patt - 40 sts = 12.9cm and 60 rows = 6.5cm, after washing, blocking and pressing (approx T3/3). RIB: 2 x 1 (see ABBREVIATIONS) T0/0, 1 x 1 T0/0. NOTES: Ripple St Patt - Both Cam Levers on KR to PR, knit 5 rows on KH only, both Cam Levers



on KR to N, knit 4 rows FNR. See Stitch Patt Sheet No 1(A) and 1 (H) For Jacquard use Variation Switch No 7 (KRC). See Step by Step.

#### SKIRT (2 sections)

Using M cast on over 123 (129, 137, 143, 149) KH Ns as FNR, 000. T2/2 knit 4 rows. Working in Ripple St Patt throughout knit to RC517. WAISTBAND: Trans to 1 x 1 RIB, 000. Knit to RC30. T10/8 knit 1 row. Trans all sts to KH and latch cast off.

#### MAKE-UP

Wash, block and press lightly on the wrong side. Join side seams. Fold WAISTBAND in half to inside and slip st into position encasing elastic.

#### SWEATER BACK


Using M cast on over 155 (164, 173, 179, 185) KH Ns as 2 x 1 RIB, 000. Knit to RC60, COR. Push all rem Ns on KH and KR into WP. Inc 2 (1, 0, 0, 2) sts. T2/2 knit 5 rows. T3/3 set for first row of Jacquard St Patt No 1 and using Con Col knit 1 row to select Ns, 000. Working in Jacquard throughout, knit to RC240. Place a WY marker at each end of work. Knit to RC461. Trans all sts to KH. T5 knit 1 row. Waste knit centre 49 sts. Waste knit rem 54 (58, 62, 65, 69) sts at each end for shoulders.

#### FRONT

As BACK to RC405, EXCEPT use Jacquard St Patt No 2, 1 (H).

MACHINES: B1 or B2 with KR. MATERIALS: KING COLE Big Value Chunky; M - 1100g (Natural 46), Con Col - 100g (Black 48) (100% acrylic 145m/100g). 5mm Crochet Hook. MEASUREMENTS: One size to fit up to bust 101cm. TENSION: St st - 20 sts = 14.3cm and 30 rows = 12.5cm (approx T8). RIB: 1 x 1 T3/3.

#### BACK

Using M cast on over 85 KH Ns as RIB, 000 knit to RC24. Trans all sts to KH, 000. T8 knit to RC14. Inc 1 st at each end of next and every foll 14th row x 14 and AT THE SAME TIME at RC136, place a WY marker at each end of work. Knit to RC208.



#### Shoulder shaping

At side opposit K-carr, on next and every row push into HP 7 Ns x 10, then 8 Ns x 2. Cast off centre 27 sts. Waste knit rem 43 sts at each end of work for shoulders.

#### LEFT FRONT

Using M cast on over 49 KH Ns as RIB, 000. Knit to RC24. Trans all sts to KH, 000. T8 knit to RC14. Inc 1 st at left on next and every foll 14th row x 14, and, AT THE SAME TIME, at RC66 place a WY marker at right, knit to RC126.

#### Neck shaping

Dec 1 st at right on next and every foll 4th row x 20 and, AT THE SAME TIME, at RC136, place a WY marker at left. Knit to RC208.

#### Shoulder shaping


At left on next and every foll alt row, push into HP 7 Ns x 5. Waste knit over all sts.

#### RIGHT FRONT

As LEFT FRONT reversing shapings.

#### SLEEVES

Join both shoulders by placing both sets of shoulder sts back onto Ns with right sides together, Using M T10 knit 1 row and cast off. Push 84 KH Ns into WP. With wrong side facing, pick up same number of sts evenly along armhole edge between WY markers and place onto Ns, 000. T8 knit to RC4. Dec 1 st at each end of next and every foll 4th row x 17. Knit to RC72 and waste knit rem 50 sts. CUFFS: Push 31 KH Ns into WP. With wrong side facing, place sts from Cuff edge onto Ns distributing them evenly along the row. Using M. T8 knit 1 row. Trans to RIB, 000. Knit to RC19. T10/8 knit 1 row. Trans all sts to KH and latch cast off.



#### COLLAR

NOTE: "Wedges" are worked every 18 rows. Disconnect RC before you beg the wedge and reconnect it when you have finished each wedge. Inc and dec is worked only when the RC is connected. When working the wedges the Ns are pushed into HP from left to right, once the first set of Ns are pushed into HP, the subsequent groups of Ns are described as "inside" Ns. There are 14 wedges and the figures given between the square brackets [] are for each, in the order in which you knit them (tick them off as you work them!).

Using M cast on 3 sts over Ns 28 to 30 to the right of '0', 000. T8 knit 2 rows. Inc 1 st at left on next and every foll alt row x 30, then every foll 3rd row x 30 [63 sts], then, at RC205 dec 1 st at left on next and every foll 3rd row x 30, then every foll alt row x 30, and, AT THE SAME TIME at RC60, beg "wedges". (PLEASE READ INSTRUCTIONS BEFORE STARTING!).

5TH THROUGH TO 10TH WEDGE - start as follows: Push [12: 7: 7: 7: 7: 12:] Ns into HP. Knit 2 rows \* push 5 inside Ns into HP, knit 2 rows \* work from \* to \* x 1: 3: 3: 3: 3: 1:. ALL WEDGES - push 15: 15: 15: 15: 5: 5: 5: 5: 5: 5: 15: 15: 15: 15: Ns at left (or inside Ns) into HP. Change to Con Col and knit 2 rows, push 5 inside Ns into HP knit 2 rows. Change to M - \* push 5 inside Ns into HP, knit 2 rows\* work from \* to \* x [2: 3: 4: 5: 5: 5: 5: 5: 5: 5: 5: 4: 3: 2:], \*\* take back 5 inside Ns into UWP knit 2 rows\*\* work from \*\* to \*\* x [1: 2: 3: 4: 4: 4: 4: 4: 4: 4: 4: 3: 2: 1:] Take back 5 inside Ns to UWP, change to Con Col, knit 2 rows. Take back 5 inside Ns to UWP knit 2 rows. 5TH THROUGH TO 10TH WEDGE ONLY - end as folls: Change to M. \*\*\* Take back to UWP 5 inside Ns knit 2 rows \*\*\*, work from \*\*\* to \*\*\* x [ 2: 4: 4: 4: 4: 2:]. ALL WEDGES - push all Ns into UWP and using M knit 18 rows.

#### MAKE-UP


Join side and SLEEVE seams. Attach COLLAR to Front opening edges and Back Neck, between WY markers. EDGING: Using 5mm hook and Con Col, with right side facing, work 1 row treble crochet up RIGHT FRONT to COLLAR, 1 row treble crochet down left front from collar to hem and then 1 row treble crochet around COLLAR.



MACHINES: A, C or D with KR. MATERIALS: KING COLE Anti-Tickle Superspun Superwash 4-Ply Wool; M - 450 (470, 490, 510, 530)g (Aran 46), Con col - 375 (390, 405, 420, 435)g (Black 48) (100% wool 380m/100g). MEASUREMENTS: To fit bust 86 (91, 96, 101, 106)cm. TENSION: Fairisle St Patt - 40 sts = 12.1cm and 60 rows = 15cm (approx T6). RIB: 2 x 1 (see ABBREVIATIONS) T3/3. NOTES: See Stitch Pattern Sheet No 1(I).

#### BACK

Using M cast on over 167 (173, 182, 191, 199) KH Ns as RIB, 000. Knit to RC7. Trans all sts to KH. Inc 0 (2, 1, 0, 2) sts. T6 set for first row of Fairisle St Patt and knit 1 row to select Ns, 000. With M in FA and Con Col in FB throughout, knit to RC292. Place a WY marker at each end of work. Knit to RC396. Waste knit centre 53 sts. Waste knit rem 57 (61, 65, 69, 73) sts at each end for shoulders.









#### BACK

Using WY cast on over 85 (89, 93, 97, 101) KH Ns and knit a few rows ending with COL. Set for first row of Fairisle St Patt, using M T8 knit 1 row to select Ns, 000. With M in FA and Con Col in FB throughout knit to RC66. Place a WY marker at each end of work. Knit to RC122. Waste knit centre 31 sts. Waste knit rem 27 (29, 31, 33, 35) sts at each end of work for shoulders. WAIST RIB: Push 69 (73, 75, 81, 83) KH Ns into WP. With wrong side facing, place sts from waist edge back onto Ns distributing them evenly along the row. Using M T8 knit 1 row. Trans to RIB, 000. Knit to RC23. T10/8 knit 1 row. Trans all sts to KH and latch cast off.



Knit to RC94 and waste knit rem 53 sts. CUFFS: Push 39 KH Ns into WP. With wrong side facing, place sts from cuff edge back onto Ns distributing them evenly along the row. Using M T8 knit 1 row. Trans to RIB, 000. Knit to RC17. T10/8 knit 1 row. Trans all sts to KH and latch cast off.



Waste knit rem 55 (59, 63, 67, 71) sts at each end for shoulders. WAIST RIB: Push 125 (134, 143, 152, 161) KH Ns into WP. With wrong side facing, place sts from waist edge back onto Ns distributing them evenly along the row. Trans to RIB, 000. Using M knit to RC35. T10/8 knit 1 row. Trans all sts to KH and latch cast off each st individually.





CUFFS: Push 71 KH Ns into WP. With wrong side facing, place sts from Cuff edge back onto Ns distributing them evenly along the row. Trans to RIB, 000. Knit to RC49. T10/8 knit 1 row. Trans all sts to KH and latch cast off each st individually.

#### MAKE-UP

Block and press. Join side and SLEEVE seams.

#### LONG SKIRT

Using WY cast on over 194 KH Ns and knit a few rows ending with COL. Using M T7 knit 1 row, \* 000. (Always taking yarn round inside N), at left on next and every foll alt row push into HP, 14 Ns x 1, 10 Ns x 13 then 5 Ns x 9 and, AT THE SAME TIME, at RC26 change to Con Col and knit 4 rows, change to M. [RC46, 5 Ns at right end in WPJ. At right on next and every foll alt row, take back to UWP, 5 inside Ns x 9, then 10 inside Ns x 13 and, AT THE SAME TIME, at RC60 change to Con Col and knit 4 rows, change to M. [RC90, 14 Ns at left in HP]. Knit 20 rows over all Ns \*. Work from \* to \* x 14 (15, 16, 17, 18). Waste knit. WAIST-BAND(2): Push 101 (107, 113, 119, 120) KH Ns into WP. With wrong side facing, pick up same number of sts evenly along half waist edge and place onto Ns. Using M T7 knit 1 row. Trans to 1 x 1 RIB, 000. T1/1 knit to RC23. T10/8 knit 1 row. Trans all sts to KH and backstitch cast off.



Waste knit 50 (53, 57, 61, 65) sts at each end of work for shoulders. Cast off rem 60 sts.

#### POCKETS

Using M COBH over 43 KH Ns, 000. T9 knit to RC50 and waste knit.

#### RIGHT FRONT



Working in Fairisle throughout knit to RC8. Dec 1 st at each end of next and every foll 4th row x 42. Knit to RC176 and waste knit rem 86 sts. CUFFS: Push 65 KH Ns into WP. With wrong side facing place sts from cuff edge back onto Ns. Trans to RIB, 000. Using M knit to RC9. T10/8 knit 1 row. Trans all sts to KH and latch cast off each st individually.

#### BUTTON/-BUTTONHOLE BAND

Using M cast on over 15 KH Ns as 1 x 1 RIB, 000. T2/2 knit to RC4. Work a 2 st buttonhole at centre of next and every foll 26th row x 7. Knit until long enough to go around Front opening edges and back neck, cast off. Attach.

#### MAKE-UP

Mock Pocket Tops:- Using M cast on over 35 KH Ns as RIB, 000. Knit to RC12. Trans all sts to KH, T9 knit 1 row and waste knit. Backstitch to garment as illustrated, through last row knitted in M. Work Swiss darning. Wash, block and press. Join side and SLEEVE seams. Attach buttons.





Trans all sts to KH and latch cast off.

As BACK to RC72 (80, 100, 132, 144), COR.

#### Divide for Front opening



Set for first row of Fairisle St Patt and using M T9 knit 1 row to select Ns, 000. Working in Fairisle Stitch Patt (see NOTES) throughout, knit to RC4 (5, 8, 3, 6). With wrong side facing, place sts from cuff edge onto Ns distributing them evenly along the row. Using M T9 knit 1 row. Trans to RIB, 000. Knit to RC23. T10/8 knit 1 row. Trans all sts to KH and latch cast off.

#### MAKE-UP





Waste knit rem 52 (56, 60, 64, 68) sts at each end of work for shoulders. WAIST RIB: Push 149 (158, 167, 173, 182) KH Ns into WP. With wrong side facing, place sts from waist edge onto Ns distributing them evenly along the row. Trans to RIB, 000. Working in Cable Rib (see RIB) throughout, knit to RC39. T10/8 knit 1 row. Trans all sts to KH and latch cast off each st individually.

Using M COBH from right to left over 77 KH Ns, 000. T2 working in RIB, knit to RC16. Attach ready made lace. T6 knit 1 row. With wrong side facing, pick up same number of sts evenly along neck edge of BONNET and place onto Ns. T6 knit 1 row. T10 knit 1 row and cast off.

#### MAKE-UP

Knit 2 cords and attach to ends of NECKBAND.

#### BOOTEES


Using M COBH from right to left over 29 KH Ns. Attach ready made lace. Using KH T6 knit 1 row, 000. T6 working in Garter St throughout, knit to RC40. Break yarn. Waste knit 9 sts at each end of work, 000. T7 set for Garter St Patt, knit to RC5. Repeat from \*\* to \*\* (see NOTES) throughout. Knit to RC20. Working in Garter St, T5 cast on 20 sts at beg of next 2 rows. Dec Tension by every 2 rows, knit to RC42. Cast off.

#### MAKE-UP

Push 20 KH Ns into WP. With right side facing, pick up the 20 'cast on' sts and place onto Ns. Attach ready made lace. With wrong side facing, pick up the 9 sts from waste knitting and 11 sts evenly along side edge of Garter St Patt and lace section and place onto Ns. T6 knit 1 row. T10 knit 1 row and cast off. Join back and



MACHINES: A, C or D with Intarsia facility of Intarsia Carriage and KR. MATERIALS: KING COLE Anti-Tickle Superspun Superwash 4 -Ply Wool; M - (Scarlet 9), and B - (White 1) [L] 220 (240, 260, 280, 300, 320)g [M] 240 (260, 280, 300, 320, 340)g, A - (Black 48) and C - (Silver 36) [L] 100 (110, 120, 130, 140, 150)g [M] 120 (130, 140, 150, 160, 170)g. (100% wool 380m/100g). MEASUREMENTS: To fit chest/bust 86 (91, 96, 101, 106, 111)cm. TENSION: St st and Fairisle St Patt - 40 sts = 13.3cm and 60 rows = 13.6cm (approx T500 for St St and T6 for Fairisle) RIB: 2 x 1 T2/2 (see Abbreviations). NOTES: See Stitch Pattern Sheet No 4(F) for Fairisle St Patt 1 and No 4(D) for Fairisle St Patt 2, and Intarsia Pattern Sheet No 2(B). Fairisle St Patt 1 - \*With M in FA throughout, knit 2 rows in each of A, B and C in FB \* Repeat from \* to \* throughout.



#### BACK

Using WY cast on over 152 (160, 166, 174, 182, 190) KH Ns and knit a few rows ending with COL. T6 using M, set for first row of Fairisle St Patt 1 and knit 1 row to select Ns, 000. Working in Fairisle St Patt knit to [L] RC108, [M] RC126. Using C knit 1 row. Set for first row of Fairisle St Patt 2 and knit 1 row to select Ns. With C in FA and A in FB knit 5 rows, knit 2 rows in each of C, A, and C. With C in FA and A in FB knit 5 rows. Knit 2 rows in each of C and A. Place a WY marker at each end of work. Using B only knit to [L] RC244 [M] RC276. Waste knit centre [L] 78 sts [M] 90 sts. Waste knit rem [L] 37 (41, 44, 46, 50, 54) sts, [M] 31 (35, 38, 42, 46, 50) sts at each end of work for shoulders. WAIST RIB: Push 125 (131, 140, 146, 155, 161) KH Ns into WP. With wrong side facing, return sts from waist edge back onto Ns distributing them evenly along the row. Trans to RIB, 000.

\*\* Using A knit 1 row, using C knit 2 rows, using A knit 1 row, using B knit 2 rows.\*\* Repeat from \*\* to \*\* x 6. Using A knit 1 row, using M knit 5 rows. T10/8 knit 1 row. Trans all sts to KH and latch cast off each st individually.

#### FRONT


As BACK to [L] RC164 and [M] RC182.

**Neck shaping** 

Waste knit all sts at left of centre. Knit 2 rows. Dec 1 st at left on next and every foll alt row x [L] 39, [M] 45, and, AT THE SAME TIME work intarsia emblem following Chart. Knit to [L] RC254 [M] RC284 and waste knit rem [L] 37 (41, 44, 46, 50, 54) sts, [M] 31 (35, 38, 42, 46, 50) sts. Return sts at left to Ns and knit to match right side reversing shapings and omitting emblem. WAIST RIB: As BACK.

#### NECKBAND

Join one shoulder by placing one set of shoulder sts back onto Ns with right sides together. Using B T10 knit 1 row and cast off. Using A cast on over [L] 140 and [M] 161 KH Ns as RIB, 000. \*\*\* Using B knit 2 rows, using A knit 1 row, using C knit 2 rows, using A knit 1 row \*\*\*. Repeat from \*\*\* to \*\*\* x 4. With right side facing, pick up same number of sts evenly along BACK neck edge and one front neck edge and place onto Ns. Using M T6 knit 5 rows and waste knit. Repeat for second front neck edge using [L] 62 and [M] 71 KH Ns. Join second shoulder as first. Join NECKBAND seam. Backstitch to garment through last row knitted in M. Stitch side edges of NECK-BAND to garment crossing one over the other as illustrated.



Dec 1 st at each end of next and every foll 6th row x [L] 30, [M] 34. Knit to [L] RC180 [M] RC207 and waste knit rem [L] 102 sts [M] 112 sts. CUFFS: Push [L] 65 [M] 77 KH Ns into WP. With wrong side facing, return sts from cuff edge to Ns distributing them evenly along the row. Trans to RIB, 000. Repeat from \*\* to \*\* x 5. Using A knit 1 row. Using M knit 5 rows. T10/8 knit 1 row. Trans all sts to KH and latch cast off each st individually.

#### MAKE-UP

Block and press. Join side and SLEEVE seams.





NOTES: See Stitch Pattern Sheet No 3(E) for Single Motif. BACK is worked in st st only. SLEEVES - Work one Single Motif on each SLEEVE as illustrated. FRONT - C machines - Work required number of Single Motifs at random, D machines with patterning facility over 200 Ns - place Single Motifs where required - see Step-by-Step.

#### BACK

Using WY cast on over 152 (160, 166, 174, 182, 190) KH Ns and knit a few rows ending with COR, 000. T6 using M knit to [L] RC132, [M] RC158. Place a WY marker at each end of work. Knit to [L] RC246 [M] RC286. Waste knit centre [L] 60 sts [M] 72 sts. Waste knit rem [L] 46 (50, 53, 57, 61, 65) sts, [M] 40 (44, 47, 51, 55, 59) sts, at each end of work for shoulders. WAIST RIB: Push 125 (131, 140, 146, 155, 161) KH Ns into WP. With wrong side facing, return sts from waist edge back onto Ns distributing them evenly along the row. Trans to RIB, 000. Working in stripes of 2 rows A, 2 rows B, knit to RC35. T10/8 knit 1 row. Trans all sts to KH and latch cast off each st individually.

#### FRONT

As BACK to [L] RC194 and [M] RC224, COR.




#### Neck shaping

Cast off centre [L] 20 sts, [M] 26 sts. Waste knit sts at left. Knit 1 row. Dec 1 st fully fashioned - take 3 sts at neck edge and move them to the right by 1 N - at beg of next and every foll 3rd row x [L] 20, [M] 23. Knit to [L] RC256 [M] RC294 and waste knit rem [L] 46 (50, 53, 57, 61, 65) sts, [M] 40 (44, 47, 51, 55, 59) sts. Return sts at left to Ns and knit to match right side reversing shapings'. WAIST RIB: As BACK.

#### COLLAR

Join both shoulders by placing both sets of shoulder sts back onto Ns with right sides together. Using M T10 knit 1 row and cast off. Using A cast on over [L] 146 and [M] 170 KH Ns as RIB, 000. Working in stripes of 2 rows A, 2 rows B, knit to [L] RC36, [M] RC44. Trans all sts to KH, T6 knit 1 row. With wrong side facing, working from beg of neck shaping, pick up [L] 43 sts, [M] 49 sts evenly along neck edge and place onto Ns. Push Ns forward until loops slip behind latches, place yarn into hooks of Ns and manually take Ns back to WP knitting the sts. Latch cast off these sts. Repeat as above for [L] 60 sts, [M] 72 sts of BACK neck and rem sts for second side of neck. Join sides of COLLAR to cast off edge of FRONT neck overlapping as illustrated.



#### SLEEVES



Dec 1 st at each end of next and every foll 6th row x [L] 30, [M] 34. Knit to [L] RC180 [M] RC208 and waste knit rem [L] 102 sts [M] 112 sts. CUFFS: Push [L] 65 [M] 77 KH Ns into WP. With wrong side facing, return sts from cuff edge to Ns distributing them evenly along the row. Trans to RIB, 000. Working in Stripes as WAIST RIB knit to RC31. T10/8 knit 1 row. Trans all sts to KH and latch cast off each st individually.

#### MAKE-UP

Block and press. Join side and SLEEVE seams.



MACHINES: A, C or D with KR. MATERIALS: YEOMAN YARNS Jacky; M - 330 (345, 360, 375, 390)g (Pink) (50% mohair 50% acrylic 400m/100g). 6 metres of ready-made lace, 3 buttons. MEASURE-MENTS: To fit bust 86 (91, 96, 101, 106)cm. TENSION: Lace St Patt -40 sts = 16.6cm and 60 rows = 17.6cm (approx T9). RIB: 1 x 1 T2/2. NOTES: See Stitch Pattern Sheet No 3(B) for Lace St Patt. See STEP-BY-STEP for procedure for attaching ready-made lace.



#### BACK

Using WY cast on over 122 (128, 134, 140, 146) KH Ns and knit a few rows ending with COR, 000. T9 using M knit to RC8. Working in Lace St Patt throughout, knit to RC102. Place a WY marker at each end of work. Knit to RC146.

#### Neck shaping

(Note Patt position). Waste knit centre 20 sts. Waste knit sts at left, COR. Knit 1 row. At beg of next and every foll alt row cast off 4 sts x 1, 3 sts x 2, 2 sts x 3, then dec 1 st x 16. Knit to RC194 and waste knit rem 19 (22, 25, 28, 31) sts. Return sts at left to Ns and knit to match right side reversing shapings. WAIST RIB: Push 107 (113, 121, 125, 133) KH Ns into WP. With wrong side facing, place sts from waist edge onto Ns distributing them evenly along the row. Using M T9 knit 1 row. Trans to RIB, 000. Knit to RC39. T10/8 knit 1 row. Trans all sts to KH and latch cast off.



attach ready-made lace, knit 12 rows \*. Repeat from \* to \*, attach ready made lace, knit 1 row and waste knit. With wrong side facing, return sts to Ns and knit 8 rows. Working in Lace St Patt throughout, knit to RC144. Waste knit rem 129 sts. With right side facing, return sts to Ns. With wrong side facing, pick up same number of sts evenly along armhole edge between WY markers and place onto Ns. Using M T10 knit 1 row and cast off. CUFFS: Push 53 KH Ns into WP. With wrong side facing, place sts from cuff edge onto Ns distributing them evenly along the row. Using M T9 knit 1 row. Trans to RIB, 000. Knit to RC29. T10/8 knit 1 row. Trans all sts to KH and latch cast off.

#### YOKE

Using WY cast on over 199 KH Ns and knit a few rows. Using M T9 knit 2 rows. \*\* Attach ready-made lace, knit 11 rows and waste knit \*\*. Push 151 KH Ns into WP. \*\*\* With right side facing, place sts back onto Ns distributing them evenly along the row, knit 1 row \*\*\*. Repeat from \*\* to \*\*. Push 115 KH Ns into WP. Repeat from \*\*\* to \*\*\*. Repeat from \*\* to \*\*. Push 91 KH Ns into WP. Repeat from \*\*\* to \*\*\*. Attach ready made lace, knit 1 row. Trans to RIB, 000. Knit to RC7. T10/8 knit 1 row. Trans all sts to KH and latch cast off. Push 199 KH Ns into WP. With right side facing, return sts from YOKE to Ns. With wrong side facing, working from beg of FRONT neck shaping, pick up 99 sts evenly along neck edge to centre BACK and place onto Ns. Push these Ns forward until loops slip behind latches, place yarn into hooks and manually take Ns back to WP knitting the sts. Latch cast off these sts. Repeat as above for rem 100 sts.

#### BUTTONHOLE BAND

Using M cast on over 27 KH Ns as RIB, 000. Knit to RC4. Work 3 x 2 st buttonholes evenly spaced along the row. Knit to RC8. Trans all sts to KH. T9 knit 1 row. With wrong side facing, pick up same number of sts evenly along right FRONT opening edge and place onto Ns. T10 knit 1 row and cast off.

#### **BUTTON BAND** As BUTTONHOLE BAND omitting buttonholes.



Attach ready-made Lace and knit 1 row. Set for first row of Tuck St Patt and knit 1 row to select Ns, 000. Working in Tuck St Patt throughout, knit to RC324.



Armhole shaping

Cast off 3 sts at beg of next 2 rows. Dec 1 st at each end of next and every foll alt row x 18 (21, 22, 24, 27). Knit to RC362 (368, 370, 376, 382). [83 (85, 89, 91, 93)sts]. Trans to RIB, 000. Knit to RC7. T10/8 knit 1 row. Trans all sts to KH and latch cast off.

#### FRONT As BACK to RC240.

Neck shaping

(Note patt position). Dec 1 st at centre. Waste knit all sts at left, COR. Knit 3 rows. Dec 1 st at left on next and every foll 3rd row x 38 (39, 41, 42, 43) and AT THE SAME TIME at RC324, work

#### Armhole shaping Cast off 3 sts at beg of next row. Knit

1 row. Dec 1 st at right on next and every foll alt row x 18 (21, 22, 24, 27). Knit to RC362 (368, 370, 376, 382) and cast off rem 3 sts. Return sts at left to Ns and knit to match right side reversing shapings.

#### LEFT STRAP AND 'VEE' INSERT

Using WY cast on over 160 (164, 166, 168, 172) KH Ns and knit a few rows ending with COR, 000. Using M T6 knit 2 rows. \*\* At left dec 1 st on next and every foll alt row x 2, then every row x 2 \*\*. Repeat from \*\* to \*\* x 7, then dec 1 st on alt rows x 2 and, AT THE SAME TIME, at RC10 repeat from \* to \* x 3. Attach ready-made lace. Knit to RC48. Trans to RIB and knit 3 rows. T10/8 knit 1 row. Trans all sts to KH and latch cast off.

#### RIGHT STRAP AND 'VEE' INSERT

As LEFT STRAP AND 'VEE' INSERT reversing shapings.

#### MAKE-UP

Armhole Bands (4): Using M cast on over 27 (29, 31, 35, 37) KH Ns as RIB, 000. Knit to RC8. Trans all sts to KH. With wrong side facing, pick up same number of sts evenly along armhole edge and place onto Ns. Using M, T10 knit 1 row and cast off. Join shaped edges of 'Vee' insert. Push 72 (76, 78, 82, 86) KH Ns into WP. With right side facing, starting from the right end, pick up same number of sts along the LEFT STRAP and place onto Ns. With wrong side facing, pick up same number of sts evenly along Left Front opening edge and place onto Ns. Using M T10 knit 1 row and cast off. Push 87 KH Ns into WP. With right side facing, place rem sts from STRAP onto Ns. Trans to RIB and knit 3 rows. T10/8 knit 1 row. Trans all sts to KH and latch cast off. Repeat as above for RIGHT STRAP. Join side seams. Attach STRAPS to



Cast off 3 sts at beg of next row. Knit 1 row. Dec 1 st at right on next and every foll alt row x 13 (15, 14, 18, 18) then every row x 9 (9, 13, 11, 13). Knit to RC388 (392, 394, 398, 402) and cast off rem 3 sts. Return sts at left to Ns and knit to match right side reversing shapings.

#### STRAPS AND 'VEE' INSERT

Using M COBH over 44 KH Ns. T6 knit 1 row. Set for first row of Fairisle St Patt and knit 1 row to select Ns, 000. With M in FA and A in FB throughout knit to RC120 (adjust length here). Place a WY marker at left end of work. Knit to RC160. Dec 1 st at right on next and every foll alt row x 42. Knit 1 row and cast off rem 2 sts. Knit a second STRAP reversing shaping and pattern.

#### MAKE-UP

Armhole Bands (4): Using M cast on over 29 (31, 33, 37, 39) KH Ns as RIB, 000. Knit to RC8. Trans all sts to KH. With wrong side facing, pick up same number of sts evenly along armhole edge and place onto Ns. Using M T10 knit 1 row and cast off. Join centre front seam. Attach Insert to neck edge of FRONT to WY markers. Join side seams. Using A

# ANOTHER TIP FROM BRENDA

When working the zig-zag row on the ribber in 2 ends of 2/30's one of the ends is often left behind giving an untidy and difficult cast on, and a lot of time can be wasted trying to pick up the 2nd end. If, instead, you knit the zig-zag row from the LEFT, it eliminates the problem. Give it a try!

# KNITTING FOR GOOD HEALTH

#### **UNTANGLED INTARSIA**

Rita Johnson, who has been knitting for many years, demonstrated intarsia to New Mill Machine Knitting Club, and the way she controls the yarn is the simplest yet! All you need are the old fashioned dolly pegs with the head on top, the yarn is wrapped around the peg and a slip loop is put over the head (the best way to describe the slip loop is to think of casting on by hand with the thumb method, the yarn is wrapped around the thumb and the needle is pushed into the loop, but in this case the head of the dolly peg). This method allows the yarn to be unwound as you lay it across the needles but still under control when you let the peg down to use the next colour, it really is simple!

#### **USING D.K. YARN**

A Member of Lilian Vine's Knitting Club has quite a lot of D.K. wool, which was of the thicker variety, and even on tension 10 the garment was still too stiff. Lilian explained how to use alternate needles and to convince her Member, knitted a small sample in the same yarn - she couldn't believe the different it made!

"I am delighted with the discs that you are now supplying with MACHINE KNITTING FASHION. it saves a lot of time. MACHINE KNITTING FASHION is still the best magazine but a word of warning. I know of knitters who have cancelled one knitting magazine because "the magazine is too much on the electronics", non-electronic owners appear to be afraid of patterns when they sate electronic and cannot try to convert to punchcard or use an alternative stitch pattern, may I suggest that wherever possible you print an alternative punchcard design or sugggest a card which can be used instead.'



MACHINE KNITTING: THE TECHNIQUE OF KNITWEAVE by KATHLEEN KINDER Published by Batsford



Knitweave is one of the most exciting and versatile stitch patterns that can be achieve on Japanese single-bed machines. The fine, fluid textures it produces make it a highly useful and creative medium, and Kathleen Kinder has here provided the knitter with all the information needed to understand this method and produce beautiful results. A short history of the technique's use and development is followed by sections on the two main knitweave structures, approaches to sampling and designing surface patterns. A final chapter contains patterns for ten different garments involving features or techniques discussed earlier in the text.

# SPECTRUM YARNS FOR MACHINE KNITTERS

The new 1990/91 Spectrum shade book sees a 25% increase in the number of shades in their popular Linaria range of cones for machine knitters. The range now has 40 shades with the addition of 14 new ones for this Autumn. New brights include Jade, Cerise and Aster, a strong contrast to the dark Burgundy, Mocha, Smoke and Juniper. Strong pastels include Passion, a sugar almond pink, Mint, Waterfall and Airforce.

Also available on cone is Spectrum's Aran Style 80% Courtelle/20% wool mix. The 800g cone is available in Cream only, but it can be used in conjunction with the Strata Aran balled yarn for cost-effective machine-knit Fair Isle or intarsia designs, where a lot of colours are required in smaller quantities.

Spectrum's Detroit 4ply Perle yarn is suitable for use on standard gauge machines. The 100g balls, which retail at £1.39, can be used for multicoloured Fair Isles, and a garment which uses say seven shades can be knitted for just over £11.

#### SUCCESSFUL WASHING AND FINISHING OF WOOL KNITWEAR

SANSOLAINE -1ST WASH FOR WOOL - a liquid composite surfactant formulated particularly for the washing of knitwear made from oiled yarns in Cashmere, Shetland, Lambswool or Botany Wool. It is used commercially by large knitwear manufacturers in Scotland and the Midlands as well as woollen and worsted finishers in West Yorkshire. Manufactured on our site at Stansfield Mill, Triangle, Sowerby Bridge, West Yorkshire by Protech Ltd an associate company of S & J Andrews (WY) Ltd with retail marketing by Amber Yarns of Shipley.

Because it is used industrially where consistent colours are critical. No aggressive additives such as perborates or optical brighteners are incorporated thus any undesired colour changes are avoided. Efficient oil removing (emulsifying) detergents are used combined with surfactants including a natural soap, added to promote a soft luxurious handle in the finished garment. Carefully selected builders are used to give the correct conditions for scouring and rinsing yet avoiding the high wool damaging alkalinity of domestic washing powders.

The liquid product, which is environmental friendly is supplied to home knitters in the same concentration as used by industry so that relatively small quantities are used. Sansolaine is used in industrial washing machines where high foaming needs to be avoided, and may also be used with care in domestic washing machines.

Most yarns and particularly those produced on the woollen spinning system contain up to 10% of fibre lubricants added to aid spinning and associated mill operations. This oil needs to be removed so that garments are fresh and clean ready for sale. Removing the spinning oil also removes any debris picked up during processing and also allows the yarn to bulk giving the full soft handle associated with natural fibres.

During storage the dyestuffs used in colouring the yarns can leach out into the lubricant, this applies particularly for heavy shades. If this dyestuff contaminated lubricant is not removed completely this reserve of unfixed dyestuff can readily stain adjoining whites and pastel shades. Many complaints of poor colour fastness arise because washing with a convenient domestic liquid does not completely remove the difficult oil/dyestuff mixture.

Thorough washing allows the full soft handle of wool to develop. With Sansolaine, additives including pure soap are present to promote softness without recourse to cationic softeners which can give an oily/waxy handle. Whist Sansolain - is called first wash for wool, it can also be used for re-washing any knitwear, when half quantities are sufficient. It is in fact so versatile that it can also be used for a variety of domestic applications including bath cleaning, (non abrasive) car washing etc. It can also be an effective stain remover when the concentrated liquid is rubbed gently into a stain, splash or oil mark, rinsing in fresh warm water often completely removing the offending stain.

#### MACHINE KNITTING COURSES AT HERDWICK FARM

Herdwick Farm is a full working farm set in one of the most beautiful agricultural areas of Britain. It is about 20 miles north of Dartmoor and about 20 miles south of the coast. The families moved to Devon from the Home Counties in 1959, and have been farming there since 1963.

Shirley Cowling is an Honours Arts graduate of London University, and has many years experience as a teacher, hand, and machine knitter. Many of her articles about knitting and design have been published in National magazine, and she has given courses at Herdwick continuously since 1984.

Courses normally run from Monday to Thursday and consist of four hours of individual tuition each day. During that time the completion of a garment incorporating techniques new to the student is attempted. 

Armhole shaping

Cast off 2 sts at beg of next 2 rows. Knit 0 (0, 2, 2, 2) rows. Dec 1 st at each end of next and every foll alt row x 18 (20, 21, 23, 25). Knit to RC414 (418, 422, 426, 430). [75 (77, 81, 83, 85) sts]. Trans to RIB, 000. Knit to RC7. T10/8 knit 1 row. Trans all sts to KH and latch cast off.

# FRONT As BACK to RC280.

Neck shaping

(Note patt postion). Dec 1 st at centre. Waste knit all sts at left, COR. Knit 3 rows. Dec 1 st at left on next and every foll 3rd row x 2 (2, 6, 6, 6) then every foll 4th row x 32 (33, 31,

Armhole shaping

With wrong side facing, pick up same number of sts evenly along armhole edge and place onto Ns. Using M T10 knit 1 row and cast off. Join centre front seam. Attach Insert to neck edge of FRONT to WY markers. Join side seams. Attach STRAPS to BACK.







Waste knit rem 27 (29, 30, 30, 33, 36, 36, 39, 40) sts at each end of work for shoulders. WAIST RIB: Push 74 (77, 80, 83, 86, 89, 92, 95, 98) KH Ns into WP. With wrong side facing, place sts from waist edge onto Ns distributing them evenly along the row. Trans to RIB, 000. Using M knit to RC49. T10/8 knit 1 row. Trans all sts to KH and latch cast off each st individually.

At beg of next and every foll alt row cast off 3 sts x 1, 2 sts x 2, then dec 1 st x 6 (5, 6, 7, 7, 6, 8, 7, 8). Knit to RC140 (154, 168, 180, 194, 206, 220,

With wrong side facing, return sts from cuff edge to Ns distributing them evenly along the row. Trans to RIB, 000. Using M knit to RC49. T10/8 knit 1 row. Trans all sts to KH and latch cast off each st individually.



Using D cast on over 23 (23, 23, 26, 26, 26, 29, 29, 29) KH Ns as RIB, 000. Knit to RC12. Trans all sts to KH. T6 knit 1 row and waste knit. Backstitch to FRONTS as illustrated.





Using E cast on over 26 (26, 29, 29, 32, 32, 35, 35, 38) KH Ns as RIB, 000. Knit to RC4. Trans all sts to KH, T6 knit 1 row. With wrong side facing, pick up same number of sts evenly along shaped edge of FRONT and place onto Ns. T10 knit 1 row and cast off.

#### MOCK POCKET RIB

Using A cast on over 23 (23, 23, 26, 26, 26, 29, 29, 29) KH Ns as RIB, 000. Knit to RC12. Trans all sts to KH. T6 knit 1 row and waste knit. Backstitch to LEFT FRONT as illustrated.

#### NECKBAND

Using Nylon Cord cast on over 95 (95, 95, 101, 101, 101, 107, 107, 107) KH Ns as FNR (Zig Zag row only). Using WY and working in ciular knitting, knit a few rows, 000. Using D T6/6, knit to RC6, 000. T1°°/1°°, working in FNR throughout knit to RC2. Dec 1 st at each end of next and every foll alt row x 7. Knit to RC15. T8/8 knit 1 row. Trans all sts to KH and latch cast off each st individually.

Push 77 KH Ns into WP. With wrong side facing, pick up same number of sts evenly along armhole edge between WY markers and place onto Ns, 000. Using M Ti0, working in pick up patt throughout knit to RC10. Dec 1 st at each end of next and every foll 7th row x 14. Knit to RC108 and waste knit rem 49 sts. CUFFS: Push 31 KH Ns into WP. With wrong side facing, place sts



from cuff edge back onto Ns distributing them evenly along the row. Using M T10 knit 1 row. Trans to RIB, 000. Knit to RC23. T10/8 knit 1 row. Trans all sts to KH and latch cast off.

MAKE-UP Join side and SLEEVE seams.



MACHINES: A, C or D with KR. **MATERIALS: PAMELA WISE 4-**Ply Lambswool; M - 230 (250, 270, 290, 310)g. (Black) (100% wool. 850m/100g), A - Small amount of Gold thread to mix with M. TWIL-LEY'S Goldfingering (C35 Gold) small amount (80% viscose 10% metallised polyester 500m/100g). Applique, Beads and fur pieces. Shoulder pads. MEASUREMENTS: To fit bust 86 (91, 96, 101, 106)cm. TENSION: St st - 40 sts = 13.6cm and 60 rows = 14.4cm (approx T8) after washing, blocking and pressing. RIB: 1 x 1 T2/2. NOTES: See Stitch Pattern Sheet No2 (D). A M/C's - Work Single motifs using hand selection.



Waste knit rem 33 (35, 38, 41, 44) sts at each end of work for shoulders. WAIST RIB: Push 133 (141, 147, 155, 161) KH Ns into WP. With wrong side facing, place sts from waist edge back onto Ns distributing them evenly along the row. Using M and A together, T7 knit 1 row. Trans to RIB, 000. Knit to RC59. T10/8 knit 1 row. Trans all sts to KH and latch cast off.

As BACK to RC86. Using M only



Knit to RC224 and waste knit rem 33 (35, 38, 41, 44) sts. Return sts at left to Ns and knit to match right side reversing shaping. WAIST RIB: as BACK.

#### NECKBAND

Join one shoulder by placing one set of shoulder sts back onto Ns with right sides together. Using M T10 knit 1 row and cast off. Using 4 ends of A, cast on over 121 KH Ns as RIB, 000. Knit 1 row. Using M knit to RC6. Trans all sts to KH, T7 knit 1 row. With wrong side facing, pick up same number of sts evenly along neck edge and place onto Ns. T10 knit 1 row and cast off. Join second shoulder as first. Join NECKBAND seam.



#### SLEEVES

Using WY cast on over 101 KH Ns and knit a few rows, 000. T7 using M and A together knit to RC10. Inc 1 st at each end of next and every foll 10th row x 14 and, AT THE SAME TIME, at RC50, cont to end in M only. Knit to RC154.

Sleeve head shaping

Cast off 3 sts at beg of next 2 rows. Dec 1 st at each end of next and every foll alt row x 17 then cast off 2 sts at beg of next and every row x 30. Knit to RC220 and cast off rem 29 sts. CUFFS: As BACK WAIST RIB using 65 KH Ns.

#### MAKE-UP

Wash, block and press all pieces. Attach Applique as illustrated. Set in SLEEVES gathering Sleeve Head to fit. Join side and SLEEVE seams. Set in shoulder pads.



MACHINES: A, C or D with KR. MATERIALS: TWILLEYS Silver-fingering; M - 340 (360, 380, 400, 420)g (Black with silver 102). TWILLEYS Goldfinering A - Small amount - (Purple C43) (80% viscose 20% metallised polyester 500m/100g). Appliques. Shoulder pads. MEA-SUREMENTS: To fit bust 86 (91, 96, 101, 106)cm. TENSION: St st - 40 sts = 13.2cm and 60 rows = 15.5cm (approx T9). RIB: 1 x 1 T2/2.

#### BACK

Using WY cast on over 155 (161, 169, 177, 185) KH Ns and knit a few rows ending with COR, 000. T9 using M, knit to RC10. \*\* Using A knit 1 row, \* using M knit 6 rows, using A knit 1 row \*, repeat from \* to \*.\*\* Using M only knit to RC112.


Armhole shaping

At beg of next and every foll row cast off 3 sts x 2, 2 sts x 4 (4, 4, 6, 6), then dec 1 st at each end of alt rows x 9 (9, 10, 9, 10). Knit to RC194. Waste knit centre 55 sts. Waste knit rem 34 (37, 40, 43, 46) sts at each end for shoulders. WAIST RIB: Push 135 (143, 149, 159, 165) KH Ns into WP. With wrong side facing, place sts from waist edge back onto Ns distributing them evenly along the row. Using M, T9 knit 1 row. Trans to RIB, 000. Knit to RC59. T10/8 knit 1 row. Trans all sts to KH and latch cast off.

#### FRONT As BACK to RC174.

Neck shaping

Waste knit centre 19 sts. Waste knit sts at left, COR. Knit 1 row. At beg of next and every foll alt row cast off 4 sts x 1, 3 sts x 2, 2 sts x 3, then dec 1 st x 2. Knit to RC194 and waste knit rem 34 (37, 40, 43, 46) sts. Return sts at left to Ns and knit to match right side reversing shaping. WAIST RIB: as BACK.




#### NECKBAND

Join one shoulder by placing one set of shoulder sts back onto Ns with right sides together. Using M T10 knit 1 row and cast off. Using M, cast on over 123 KH Ns as RIB, 000. Knit to RC8. knit to RC9. Inc 1 st at each end of next and every foll 9th row x 15 and, AT THE SAME TIME, at RC10, repeat from \*\* to \*\*. Knit to RC144.

#### Sleeve head shaping

Cast off 3 sts at beg of next 2 rows. Dec 1 st at each end of next and every foll alt row x 11 then cast off 2 sts at beg of next and every row x 38. Knit to RC206 and cast off rem 30 sts. CUFFS: As BACK WAIST RIB using 67 KH Ns.

#### MAKE-UP



NOTES: See Stitch Pattern Sheet No 2(A) for Single Motif and No 1(G) for Border Pattern.

#### BACK

Using WY cast on over 149 (157, 163, 171, 179) KH Ns and knit a few rows ending with COR, 000. T700 using M knit 5 rows,\* using A knit 2 rows, using M knit 1 row. Set for first row of Border Patt and knit 1 row to select Ns. With M in FA and A in FB work in Fairisle for 7 rows, set for st st and using M knit 2 rows, using A knit 2 rows \*. Using M only knit to RC124. Place a WY marker at each end of work. Knit to RC232. Cast off centre 47 sts. Waste knit rem 51 (55, 58, 62, 66) sts at each end of work for shoulders. WAIST RIB: Push 133 (141, 147, 155, 161) KH Ns into WP. With wrong side facing, place




sts from waist edge back onto Ns distributing them evenly along the row. Using M T7 knit 1 row. Trans to RIB, 000. Knit to RC39. T10/8 knit 1 row. Trans all sts to KH and latch cast off.

As BACK to RC52. Set for first row of Single Motif and knit I row to select Ns. With M in FA and A in FB work Single Motif to RC180 and, AT THE SAME TIME, at RC124, place a WY marker at each end of work. Using M only knit to RC204.

Neck shaping

Cast off centre 13 sts. Waste knit sts at left, COR. Knit 1 row. At beg of next and every foll alt row cast off 4 sts x 1, 3 sts x 1, 2 sts x 2, then dec 1 st x 6. Knit to RC240 and waste knit rem 51 (55, 58, 62, 66) sts. Return sts at left to Ns and knit to match right side reversing shaping. WAIST RIB: As BACK.



#### SLEEVES


Join both shoulders by placing both sets of shoulder sts back onto Ns with right sides together. Using M T10 knit 1 row and cast off. Push 159 KH Ns into WP. Set for first row of Single Motif and knit 1 row to select Ns. With M in FA and A in FB work Single Motif to RC4, dec 1 st at each end of next and every foll 6th row x 29 and, AT THE SAME TIME, from RC130, cont in M only to RC154. Repeat from \* to \*. Using M only knit to RC174 and waste knit rem 101 sts. CUFFS: Push 65 KH Ns into WP. With wrong side facing, place sts from Cuff edge back onto Ns distributing them evenly along the row. Using M T7 knit 1 row. Trans to RIB, 000. Knit to RC59. T10/8 knit 1 row. Trans all sts to KH and latch cast off.

#### NECKBAND

Using WY cast on over 135 KH Ns and knit a few rows. Using M T700 knit 3 rows. Trans to RIB, 000. Knit 2 rows. At beg of next and every row cast off 2 sts x 11. Knit to RC23. T10/8 knit 1 row. Trans all sts to KH and latch cast off.

#### MAKE-UP



MEASUREMENTS: To fit bust 86 (91, 96, 101, 106)cm. TENSION: St st/intarsia - 20 sts = 15.3cm and 30 rows = 14.1cm (approx T10 using Intarsia Carr and T9 using K-Carr). RIB: 1 x 1 T0/0. NOTES: 'Squares' Patt (worked at random) - Squares are worked over 11 sts; using chosen colour and working in Intarsia, knit 12 rows. Change to K-Carr and M. Push all Ns except the 11 intarsia Ns into HP. Disconnect RC, knit 12 rows, return all Ns to WP. Using Intarsia Carr and chosen colour and working in Intarsia, knit 12 rows. When garment is complete, with wrong side facing, using a separate length of M, gather centre of each of the 2 intarsia sections. Stitch side edges of "pocket like" flap. Join the two corners of the "flap" together.

#### BACK

Using WY cast on over 69 (73, 75, 79, 83) KH Ns and knit a few rows ending with COR, 000. T10 using M and working in Intarsia St Patt throughout, knit to RC68. Place a



WY marker at each end of work. Knit to RC104



Return sts at left to Ns and knit to match right side reversing shapings. WAIST RIB: Push 61 (65, 67, 71, 75) KH Ns into WP. Trans all sts to KH and latch cast off.

Waste knit centre 5 sts. Waste knit sts at left, COR. Knit 1 row. At beg of next and every foll alt row cast off 2 sts x 4, then dec 1 st x 10. Knit to RC126 and waste knit rem 14 (16, 17, 19, 21) sts. Return sts at left to Ns and knit to match right side reversing shaping. WAISTBAND: As BACK.



#### NECKBAND

Join one shoulder by placing one set of shoulder sts back onto Ns with right sides together. Using M T10 knit 1 row and cast off. Using M COBH over 105 KH Ns. T6 knit 12 rows. Trans to RIB, 000. Beg with T0/0 and inc Tension by ° every 4 rows, knit to RC20. Trans all sts to KH T9 knit 1 row. With right side facing, pick up same number of sts evenly along neck edge and place onto Ns. T9 knit 4 rows and waste knit. Join second shoulder as first. Join NECKBAND seam, and backstitch to garment through last row knitted in M.

#### SLEEVES

Push 70 KH Ns into WP. With wrong side facing, pick up same number of sts evenly along armhole edge between WY markers and place onto Ns, 000. Using M T10 and working "Squares" at random throughout, knit to RC12. Dec 1 st at each end of next and every foll 6th row x 13. Knit to RC90 and waste knit rem 44 sts. CUFFS: Push 31 KH Ns into WP. With wrong side facing, place sts from cuff edge back onto Ns distributing them evenly along the row. Using M T10 knit 1 row. Trans to RIB, 000. Knit to RC23. T10/8 knit 1 row. Trans all sts to KH and latch cast off.

#### MAKE-UP Join side and SLEEVE seams.



MACHINES: A, C or D with KL and KR. MATERIALS: Any 4-Ply (approx 350 - 420m/100g). Small amount of textured yarn for NECK-BAND. Applique. MEASURE-MENTS: To fit bust 86 (91, 96, 101, 106)cm. RIB: 1 x 1.

#### PROCEDURE

Make a tension swatch and set KL accordingly. Draw shape onto KL sheet, following 'direction of knitting' arrows. Garment is knitted from cuff to cuff starting and finishing with WY. NECKBAND is approximately 4 cm wide.

# MOHAIR



The Angora Goat, an enchanting animal, is one of the oldest surviving animals known to man, and is said to have originated in the mountains of Tibet, homeland of the pious Tibetan monks. Mohair, the fleece of this delicate creature, is famous for its softness, brilliance and receptiveness to rich dyes, facts which make its history traceable to ancient times.

As long ago as the 11th, 12th and even the 14th centuries BC, records of the existence of the Angora Goat have been uncovered. At this time, an ancient civilisation, called the Sumers, lived in Turkestan, and invented a cuneiform writing (wedge-shaped strokes). Tablets inscribed in this way record the existence of goats, kids and white wool for clothing. We can follow its certain appearance in Egypt in the Bible; 1500 years before

Christ, the book of Exodus relates, the sons of Israel fled from Egypt "carrying with them goats whose fleece was used to make fabric to dress the altar".

The Angora Goat is named after Angora in Turkey, better known today an Ankara, the capital city. The word "Mohair" is derived from the ancient Arabic work "Mukhaya" meaning "cloth of bright goats' hair".

In Ankara, the birth of the Mohair industry took place after the animals had trekked thousands of miles on an incredible journey from Turkestan. The journey began during the 13th century, when Ghengis Khan drove Suleyman Shah out of the land of the Turkomans, passing via the Caspian Sea, he drove his flocks of Angora Goats a short distance each day arriving eventually at the River Exphrates, where he met a tragic death,

drowning as he attempted to cross the

His son, Ertrugul, determined to lead his people, reached Konya and became a subject of Sultan Aladdin and was rewarded for his commendable services with a dominion reaching from Ankara to Kayseri. Here the Angora Goats settled climate being favourable, air and water pure, and conditions perfect for breeding and growing an excellent fleece. The Angoran people attributed the beauty of the fleece (Mohair) not to climatic conditions, but to the power of the Jadhi Bayram Veli, a holy man, and weaved the fleece into silk-like cloth to be worn by Sultans.

This spiral horned goat, and the versatility and beauty of Mohair were later discovered by a Dutchman in 1550, and demand generated the first Mohair itidus

try. Four years later, a pair of Angora Goats was sent as a "royal gift" to the Holy Roman Emperor. Soon supply could not satisfy demand and the Sultan of Turkey was forced to put an embargo on the export of the raw fleece. Spun Mohair continued to supply the foreign market, finally filtering into Britain around 1600, when the superior quality of European yarns quelled demand for Turkish, and looms began to disappear. Spasmodic attempts to export the goat were doomed to failure. Having success-

fully made incredible journeys over bar-

ren lands from Tibet, the Angora Goat defied all efforts of man to transport it abroad.


1740. Attempts were made to take the Angora Goat to Sweden without success. 1771. The people of the Pfalz region attempted to farm it, again in vain.

1788. In Venice, the same disappointment.

Queen Victoria of England finally put pressure on the Sultan and the ban on raw Mohair was lifted, but soaring demand led to the practice of cross-breeding.

The Angora Goat faced extinction ...






In 1830 the Angora Goat became the envy of South Africa ... twelve bucks and one doe set sail for another continent. The news of the safe arrival was revoked suddenly, when it became known that all twelve bucks had been deprived of their fertility by the wiley Ottomans. Fortunately the doe had miraculously given birth to a male kid on board ship. The doe was cross-bred with local goats resulting in a hardier animal bred for its meat. Thirty Angoras followed, and in 1856, South Africa became an important supplier of high quality Mohair due to highly selective breeding.

Success came at last, and to this day, South Africa and Turkey remain important breeding countries. Texas in the United States is also highly productive in Mohair, though this happened almost by accident in the mid-19th century, when the Sultan of Turkey asked President Polk of USA for expert advice on the production of cotton. Dr J B Davis of Columbia SC was appointed to carry out experiments on cotton growing in Turkey, he returned to the States in 1849 with nine thoroughbred Angora Goats

which were believed to be Cashmeres until identified by Richard Peters of Atlanta, a respected breeder of livestock. The animals were the source of increasing publicity and by 1860 Colonel Peters was realising prices of US\$ 1,500 per head and even its weight in silver for one.

A Boston newspaper reported in 1880 that Angora Goats were being transported hundreds of miles by mule from the province of Geredek in Asia Minor. Thus the Angora Goat settled in places few and far between, such as Texas, Turkey, South Africa, Denya, Lesotho and Argentina; some are also bred successfully in Australia and New Zealand and a few in England.

This fine animal, whose lustrous, long silky fleece revered by Kings and Sultans, the subject of admiration of many, for thousands of years, captures the imagination of fashion designers, manufacturers and interior decorators all over the world.

A rare and luxurious fibre, once zealously guarded by the Sultan of Turkey, it is unrivalled for its beauty, its silky texture, and last but not least, its durability.

Mohair is truly an exquisite fibre, and with its delicate appearance it is often a surprise to discover just how hardwearing it can be. Like most luxury fibres, Mohair requires careful handling, but when treated in the correct way it will last for a very long time, outliving many other materials

For hundreds of years, the teasel has been used to raise the 'nap' on Mohair and records show that in Ancient Egypt a natural teasel was used to comb Mohair cloth worn by the Pharoahs. Teasels are still grown in some areas of England but nowadays it is more practical to use a small brush to groom knitted mohair garments. It is important that Mohair is treated with extreme care – gentle coaxing rather than firm strokes being advisable to ease out tangles and create the lovely fluffiness for which Mohair is renowned.

When washing Mohair, tepid water and a mild 'handwashing' detergent bring the best results, and dirt should be gently squeezed out – never pull or wring. After rinsing in cool water, the garment should be laid flat to dry on a towel. It is possible to tumble dry, provided the Mohair garment is placed inside a pillow slip and a very gentle, slow programme is used. Dry cleaning is always recommended – especially if the garment has interlinings or shoulder pads.

Follow these simple guidelines and your Mohair, whether knitted or in fabric form, will provide many years of enjoyment.

## MOHAIR PROMOTION OF PARIS FASHION SCHOOL

For the fifth consecutive year, the International Mohair Association sponsored students with mens and ladieswear mohair provided by its members from England, France, Italy, Spain, Germany and Japan. Each student presented three finished garments to the jury presided over by Italian designer, Romeo Gigli.

The variety of designs and the innovative approach by the students demonstrated the versatility of mohair fabric. Luxurious fabrics in Kid, Superkid and Adult Mohair blends were available to them — some chose soft lightweight airy fabrics, some the more traditional

brushed mohairs in brilliant rich colours, others gave menswear fabrics a new twist fashioning them into sophisticated and elegant ladieswear.

First prize went to Arabelle Ray-Barman who used layers of open-work mohair fabric with a delicate lacy effect to create her cool Sicilian style dress. Second prize winner, Isabelle Derat, used a brushed mohair tweed for her suits with a hippie influence yet tailored to the 90s. The quality of mohair suiting was brought out in the folds and fall of the Japanese inspired designs of third prize winner, Agnes Morel. Romeo Gigli chose a Celtic style gown

and an intricately crocheted jacket for his special prize while the I.M.A. selected Valerie Brule, who used mohair for lattice work in her beautifully sculpted designs. As the oldest fashion school in France, Esmod provided a fitting setting for this highly successful promotion. The three year fashion courses are also held in costume design, accessories, fashion consultancy and computer aided design. Every course includes a placement within the industry and the possibility of an exchange with one of Esmod's seven overseas schools, including those in Oslo, Tokyo, Casablanca and Sao Paolo. A new Esmod

school is due to open this coming September in Lyon. Established in 1974 for the promotion of mohair, the I.M.A.represents every stage of the industry, from growers to topmakers through to the manufacturers of the exquisite fabrics used by the Esmod students. We have had great pleasure working with the students and they have thoroughly enjoyed working with these luxurious fabrics.

As the fashion world becomes increasingly attuned to the superior quality of natural fibres, the importance of mohair as a key fabric for the seasons ahead, assures its place in history to come.



# LACE ON LACE

Ready-made laces come in various widths. This will determine the number of rows in between each Lace row. Because the Lace is attached on the machine, the purl side of the garment becomes the right side. Garter St designs are perfect for this but the KH Carr must be used when knitting off the row where the Lace is attached. If you require the Lace on the plain side of the garment (Pink Sweater) then you must waste knit and turn the knitting. Some Ready-made laces have 'holes' running along the top edge - this makes it very easy to place a transfer tool through the hole for attaching to the knitting. These Laces can be attached and knitted off very easily.

SEE BABY SET Knit to required row. Place the single transfer tool through a 'hole' and place the tool onto the end N transferring the Lace to the N. Bring the N forward so that the st and the Lace are behind the latch. Work along the row in the same manner placing lace on every 2 or 3 needles ensuring that you do not stretch the lace - the lace needs to be put on loosely and evenly so that when the knitting is taken off the machine it will be slightly gathered, but beware - too loose and you will have difficulty knitting the stitches off. Ready-made Laces with no 'holes' running along the top edge and pre-gathered Laces are a little more difficult to knit off as there is more bulk along the top edge.



STEP 1. Knit to required row. Place the single transfer tool through the top of the ready-made lace and place onto the end N. Transfer ready-made lace to that N. Push the N into Holding Position so that the st and the lace are well behind the latch. Work along the row in the same manner, placing lace every 3 or 4 Ns ensuring that you do not pull the lace too tightly or too loosely along the row.



STEP 2. Push all remaining Ns into Holding Position, ensuring that the ready-made lace falls below them.



STEP 3. Set the Weaving brushes to Working Position. Knit to next "lace" row. Repeat these 3 STEPS throughout garment.







# **CABLES**

Traditional cable stitch patterns may be worked when using the Ribbing Attachment. Choose either the classic waist rib or work fairisle to match the yoke along the hem.






# PARTIAL KNITTING

**STEP-BY-STEP** — Flare is introduced to knitted fabric by working part rows or short end rows which form a "wedge" shape. This technique may be used for skirts, frills, collars, coats etc. and is easy to learn. It is important to wrap the yarn around the inside needle to prevent a hole forming, we show you Step-by-Step the two different methods.

The skirt (below) is sideways knitted. The design around the hem is produced by changing to a yarn of a contrasting colour and knitting a few rows whilst working the "wedge". Full instructions are given in the Centre Section No. 11.

Our zig-zag stitch design works equally well on the chunky knitting machine – full instructions may be found in the Centre Section No. 10.





STEP 1. Knit to required row. COR, set Knitting Carriage to HP (Holding Position). At left, push forward to HP required number of needles.



**STEP 2.** Knit 1 row – stitches in WP (Working Position) have knitted and the yarn is laying across the needles in HP. Take yarn and place it underneath the first HP Needle at right.



STEP 3. Knit 1 row.


#### **SECOND METHOD**



STEP 1. Work as FIRST METHOD, STEP 1, EXCEPT, push I less needle into HP.

**STEP 2.** Knit 1 row. Push 1 extra inside needle into HP – at right of needles in HP.

STEP 3. Knit 1 row.













### SPECIAL DESIGNS FROM CROCHETTA

Crochetta uses Brother knitting machines creating interesting stitches and effects normally only possible by hand!

ELEPHANTS – Gold Elephant appliqués (2), strips of fur (approx 36 cm.) (6), small glass pink and gold beads (420), shoulder pads (2). Price £17.00 (including postage and packing).

LEATHER SHOULDERS – Leather patches for shoulders (2), purple lurex thread for coloured knitted stripes and appliqué, coloured diamante sew-on-beads, (28 x assorted colours and sizes), shoulder pads (2). Price £17.00 (including postage and packing).

BATWING – Pearl bead strip (75 cm), white braid (3 m), silver sequin strip (60 cm), large diamante beads (5), pearly sequin strip (42 cm), white leather leaf appliqué shapes (8), lurex appliqué leaf shapes (2), loose sequins and beads - silver (approx 100), shoulder pads (2). Price £20 (including postage and packing).
